## 'Botanica 2015'... by the Mackay Botanical Art Interest Group




Mackay Regional Botanic Gardens Lagoons Gallery Wednesday September 2<sup>nd</sup> – October 25<sup>th</sup> 2015

The 'Botanica 2015' Exhibition's features Orchids both native and exotic. The artists use a range of techniques to portray their chosen subject. The exhibition will complement the 20<sup>th</sup> Australian Orchid Council Conference and Show being held in Mackay in September.

Featured image is *Dendrobium* cv. by Julie Inkson.

Botanical art combines detail, accuracy and artistry, with many hours needed for each watercolour painting, acrylic painting or graphite drawing. A glimpse into the inner workings of the botanical artists is provided by displays of their sketchbooks, photos, odd pods and all things flora, showing how the artists take a live specimen and create a "living" piece of botanical art.

### "Orchids in Paradise"



"Orchids in Paradise" was a combined 20th Australian Orchid Council and 50th Tropical Queensland Orchid Council Conference and Show held at the Mackay Entertainment and Convention Centre (MECC) on Friday the 18th September to Tuesday 22rd September 2015. It provided an opportunity for orchid and plants lovers from all parts of Australia to meet and enjoy spectacular orchid and foliage displays and learn from world-leaders in orchid breeding and culture.

The "Orchids in Paradise" pre-conference tour included visits to the Orchid House, Guided walks in the Botanic Gardens, and lunch in the Lagoons Gallery and Cafe where the Botanic Art Interest Group's (BAIG) orchid artworks were on show. The BAIG ladies also had cards made of their artworks and sold many to the visitors, especially the native orchids. Packs of these cards were used as presentation gifts for the Conference speakers.

The Pre-conference tour group were delighted to see the orchids in our Tropical Shade Garden. Swamp Orchids, Golden Orchids, Queensland

Black orchid and the Vanilla orchid were all blooming beautifully just in time for their visit. Now the Christmas orchids are beginning to bloom too.

### **Plant Profile:**

### Calanthe australasica, the Christmas Orchid



The Christmas Orchid is an evergreen terrestrial orchid. It has soft, obovate leaves which grow to 90cm with showy white flowers borne on erect spike to 150cm in summer.

Distribution: QLD, NSW, South-east Asia. Propagation is by seed or by division.

Cultivation: Readily grown in heavily shaded, moist but not badly drained position in sheltered, warm garden and is an excellent pot plant. It is commonly seen locally at Eungella.

Do you see the little figure in each individual flower?

Look carefully... there are two arms and legs, a little head with a yellow necklace or scarf and a really big sunhat?



Come and see them flowering now in the Tropical Shade Garden.

# Walk through the wild

Residents discover gardens' hidden wonders

**EVERY day Mackay** residents pass through the Botanic Gardens without knowing the full extent of its native residents.

Roughly 40 residents learnt a little bit more about the gardens last weekend at a Beautiful Walk organised by the Mackay Conservation Group.

Mackay Conservation Group project officer Peter McCallum said participants "saw things they weren't expecting" on the walk.

"We saw a carpet snake hiding under the rocks and spotted a nankeen night heron, which is unusual to see. It's lucky we had someone from Birdlife Mackay pointing out what it was," he said.

The group of explorers tasted bush food and learnt about native plants.

Mr McCallum said the group saw a Zodiac moth caterpillar, a species found in the area.

'It's got beautiful colours the caterpillar drops down on a web from the tree, and climbs back again when it thinks the danger's disappeared," he said.

The Beautiful Walk is a monthly event run by the Mackay Conservation Group, which receives funding from Mackay Regional Council's Natural Environment Levy.

Mr McCallum said the walks were a great way for residents to learn more about areas of Mackay they may already be familiar

with.

They can rediscover places like the Botanic Gardens. Most people who go there are jogging or walking the dog, and they're not really looking at the things in the gardens," he said.

"Often you have to look up into the trees to really see the wildlife."

On the last Sunday of October, the walk will take place at Sandfly Creek.

Mr McCallum said the area, situated in East Mackay, had a unique history and environment.

"In the mid-1980s there was a proposal to put a massive tourist development there, with a marina and hotel," he said.

"Eventually it was turned into an environmental reserve. It's highly valued as a site for migratory birds.




# Visitors Services Officer Talks with Community

#### **Education sessions in the Botanic Gardens.**

Schools: 165 children attended 2 Plant-ed sessions

Mackay West State School Year 2. September 11th.

118 children came in two separate groups from 9.30 – 2.30.

There were three rotations for each group, so 6 small sessions in total however, the last rotation was abandoned so the group could walk back to their school without getting too wet. The group were studying plant and creature life cycles. There were many examples to



view in our Gardens and in the display in the meeting room. The group took over all the space on the Outlook deck and outside the meeting room for lunch.



47 children came to learn about Living Things / Life cycles during their education session involving meeting room set up with creatures, posters, books and games. The walk with Maya helped the children discover many creatures that would otherwise go unnoticed.

## 'Plant a seed and grow a Mind'

2 privately arranged Small Explorers Groups "planted a seed and grew a mind".

Totalling 31 children, there are now many recycled pots with pumpkins and marigolds out in the community. Why Pumpkins and Marigolds? There were the seeds in the story which was read to the children amongst other activities that kept them interested.



We looked inside familiar fruit and vegetables to find the seeds and for some children they discovered some new tastes.



We sorted seeds and found out which ones floated.

We saw the biggest seed in the world (Coco De Mer), and the smallest gumnut that grows into a big tree. We blew parachute seeds and tossed winged seeds into the air to watch them spin all the way to the ground.



We walked in the Gardens and found even more seeds.



Making the recycled pot from newspaper required not just our hands but our arms as well.



Planting the seeds in a little hole was intricate for small hands.

Are we seeing the future horticulturists or at least future gardeners that can grow their own food?

# **Small Explorers Kindy groups.**





22 children from Eimeo Kindergarten were very keen to find creatures living in different habitats in the Botanic Gardens. They were certainly surprised to see how small the egg of the Common Grass yellow butterfly was and how the caterpillar was exactly the same colour green as the leaves it was on. Very tricky to see! It certainly inspired heads down and tail up to draw one of the caterpillars on their worksheets. Another caterpillar dropping down on a silky thread also got their attention.

## **School Holiday Activities.**

### Dinosaurs appeared in the Coal Garden and families came to see them.

There was yet another quiz for the school holidays, this time focussing on Dinosaurs. There were also Activity sessions of 2 hours with the same theme. What did they get up too?




The meeting room was set up with a glass table filled with real fossils, and on the larger table there was petrified wood, plant fossils in mud stone, a dinosaur egg which hatched over the two weeks and dinosaur dig sets.



Children ventured to the Coal Garden to see dinosaur footprints, petrified wood and plants similar to those from ancient times and had the opportunity to complete the dinosaur quiz too. One group is photographed here standing on petrified wood sample that are in the Coal Garden.



Along the walk back to the room one group discovered a wayward freshwater tortoise. We observed it in a large tub



Later in the Botanic Gardens Meeting room they pretended to be

paleontologists by digging up fossils, learning about plants similar to those dinosaurs might have eaten, while making their own plant fossils and dinosaurs using clay.



### Plant profile:

# Syzygium wilsonii subsp. wilsonii Powderpuff Lilly-Pilly.

An attractive beauty, showing off flowers and new growth in the Tropical Shade Garden.

Syzygium wilsonii subsp. wilsonii belongs to the genus of Syzygium (family Myrtaceae) containing over five hundred species, fifty occurring in Australia.

Also known as the Powderpuff Lillypilly, it is perhaps one of the most attractive and versatile of the "Lillypillies", though still somewhat unknown and underused in horticulture. The lillypillies are one of the most sought after horticultural plant groups for landscaping and gardens.

This species is endemic to the far north Queensland rainforests, from Ingham to Cooktown, in lowland rainforests from sea level to 600-700m, growing in relatively poor soils. This species can be easily incorporated into any patio, courtyard or rainforest garden.



It is a small shrub 1-3 m tall with extremely attractive flowers and foliage with clusters of edible fruit that attracts wildlife. It has weeping branches with lanceolate reddish brown new foliage. Stiff narrow leaves to 18 cm x 5 cm, dark green and dull on upper surface and paler on underneath side of leaf. This species is the only one of the lillypillies to have red flowers. They have large, fluffy heads and flower from spring to summer.

White clusters of ovoid shaped fleshy fruits. The fleshy fruits can be easily propagated from the seed once fleshy fruit has been removed.

Plant out in a shaded or sheltered position away from drying winds and full sun. It can also be used as a specimen shrub in a raised garden bed or against a wall. Keep the plant well mulched and composted, it's also responds well to regular fertilizing encouraging new growth. This species responds well to regular tip pruning increasing the number of flowers produced.

To increase the impact of the plant try to incorporate with other species such as palm lilies, native gingers, ground covers and ornamental grasses. This will help create a structured garden with differing layers of height. This species can also be used as an under storey plant for a more established rainforest garden. This species is a particularly attractive potted plant making it accessible for people with smaller gardens and courtyards. The flowers can be used to attract wildlife such as birds and honeyeaters.

This species is an excellent ornamental plant for a garden with its showy puffy flowers, reddish-pink new foliage and clusters of white fruits.



The *Offshoots* touring exhibition is a selection of works, taken from a series of five solo exhibitions presented at the Tanks Arts Centre in Cairns between 2009 and 2013. Apart from being a series of drawings, paintings and etchings, *Offshoots* is the story of a five year relationship between an artist, her local botanic gardens and her local arts centre.

Julie's work is informed by the principles of botanical illustration and incorporates a range of media including drawing, painting, etching, lithography and mixed media. She sees drawing, (in the case of this exhibition, botanical drawing) as a means to forming an intimate connection with the subject and bringing about the inspiration for creative mark making.

Julie McEnerny trained at Julian Ashton Art School in Sydney during the 1980s, later relocating to Cairns where she co-owned a popular design studio, the Chalk Art Shop, until 2008. Julie now works as a freelance artist and illustrator from her Cairns studio, exhibiting regularly and tutoring in Botanical Drawing with Queensland's Flying Arts Touring Program.
